INTERVIEW

REV. TIMOTHY KEEP

served Bible Methodist missions for twenty-six years. He, together with his wife, Becky and their five children, served as Missionaries to the Philippines from 1996 to 2009. In 2010, Tim was elected as the Director of Bible Methodist Missions where he served for twelve years. Tim and Becky are the parents of 5 children and have 4, (soon to be 5), grandchildren. They reside in Cincinnati, Ohio.

**THE BIBLE METHODIST:
WHERE WERE YOU BORN?
AND TELL US A BIT ABOUT
YOUR EARLY YEARS.**

TIM KEEP: I was born in Grand Rapids, Michigan. I am the second of three children and am just fifteen months younger than my sister, Janel. Shortly after I was born, my dad answered the call to the ministry and my parents moved to Cincinnati, Ohio where my dad began studying at God's Bible School. During that time my brother Dave joined our family.

My growing up years were adventurous. We moved a good bit and the ministry carried us from West Virginia, where dad planted and helped to build a new Wesleyan Methodist Church, to Ohio, where dad not only pastored but built another church. We then spent an unforgettable year in Tacoma, Washington, helping again with church planting. My greatest memories of those Tacoma days were of hiking in the great outdoors at the base of Mt Rainer, fishing in Puget Sound with dad and Dave, hiking through awe inspiring Douglas Fir forests, and soaking in the breathtaking views all around our home.

When I was eleven, we moved back east to Greenville, Pennsylvania where my dad would pastor the Greenville Allegheny Wesleyan Methodist Church for the next 10 years. As a teen, I loved to work and had a small lawn business. I rode my bike all over Greenville, pulling my lawnmower behind me. I loved to play sports and although my dad and brother thrived on the hunting and fishing, I'd go along mostly just to be in the outdoors. I never had much patience or desire for the actual hunt, or for sitting in a boat for long periods of time. Often when fishing, they'd drop me off on the shore and I'd figure out a way to throw and catch a ball while they labored over "dinner." Dad often took us to local gyms or softball

fields and played basketball or softball with us—even football on occasion. He also taught Dave and me the game of golf. This, I loved!

**WHEN DID YOU
BECOME A
CHRISTIAN?**

As a young person, I had a desire for God. I sought the Lord many times, but never experienced assurance of salvation. My mother was a very prayerful woman and both our parents taught us the Word of God. Memorizing scripture was a normal part of my growing up years and my dad rewarded us for doing so. Conversely, failing to meet our scripture requirements often kept us from playing outside on Saturday mornings. My siblings and I memorized the entire book of I John, the book of James, numerous Psalms, and other passages of scripture. Nevertheless, as I moved into my teen years, I became wayward and pushed back against my parents and what I considered to be the strict and unreasonable rules of the church. I started getting into trouble, hanging out with the wrong people, getting into fights, and was headed down a troubling road. And while I never caused any serious problems, my parents became convinced that they

needed to get me out of Greenville.

My mom's brother, Steven Hickman was teaching at a small bible school in Westfield, Indiana where, he assured my mom, they would welcome me even though I was just a junior in high school. I would be able to work on campus, go to school, and be surrounded by godly people and influences. This is how I ended up at Union Bible Academy.

I loved being there! It was new and exciting and everyone was kind. However, my bad behavior followed me, and I found myself expelled from school within a couple of months. Although I didn't admit it at the time, I was devastated and ashamed. I knew that I had let my parents down. I had let myself down.

My dad picked up the phone and called then-President Jim Southerland and asked if they would consider giving me another chance. He agreed (not without a lot of conditions) and that choice changed the trajectory of my life. I recently had the opportunity to thank him again for not giving up on me.

It was shortly after my return to UBC that we had school revival with the late Rev. R.E. Carroll. One evening he gave an invitation at the end of his message. I was under deep conviction but didn't respond until a faithful friend, through his tears, invited me to pray. I went forward that night and surrendered my life to Jesus. That night, January 20, 1986, my life was forever changed. It was more than a decision—there was a transformation that took place. I've failed the Lord many times since then, but His grace has held me fast.

WHERE DID YOU MEET BECKY?

I met Becky (Keaton) at UBC and shortly after my conversion we began dating. I knew that she was the girl I wanted to marry! We were married just two years later after she graduated from high school.

WHEN DID YOU DECIDE TO ENTER THE MINISTRY?

I began to feel during the first year of our marriage that God had something specific for us to do. Becky and I worked hard, saved money, and decided to move to Hobe Sound Bible College to begin our preparation. Becky would attend Indian River Community College and obtain a nursing degree.

I enrolled in the ministerial program at HSBC, but at the beginning of my sophomore year I knew that I was to change my major to missions. It was also that year that we welcomed our first child, Valerie. It was wonderful and difficult all at the same time. Becky worked evenings and so, for the remainder of my college years, Valerie was my “studying-buddy” at night. Becky and I grew up quickly as we had this new little person to care for while we navigated work and college.

During my junior year of college, Dr. Michael Avery came to speak to us during a leadership conference. He was currently serving as the Director for Bible Methodist Missions and shared about a new

and exciting work taking place in the Philippines. He told of a church planting movement in the Cordillera (mountainous) region led by pastor David Yuccaddi. I can’t quite explain it, but as Dr. Avery spoke of how the Holy Spirit was moving in this place, and of Rev. Yuccaddi’s conversion and vision, a great desire welled up within my heart and I thought, “God, I would be so honored if you would someday allow me to partner with that vision, and with that man.”

I never forgot that evening and the impact of the message, but after receiving my BA in Missiology from HSBC, God called us into pastoral ministry in the beautiful town of Muskegon, Michigan. God used the next three and a half years

to teach us important lessons. He formed both Becky and me in many areas of our lives. It was here that I learned the importance of really knowing God, of seeking Him, of walking with Him, of working with people. God gave us souls and opportunities to disciple people in the faith. In May of 1994, we happily welcomed our second child, Timothy Jr. into our family.

It was about one year into our ministry at Muskegon that we again had the opportunity to hear Dr. Avery speak. This time, he had with him Rev. David Yuccaddi from the Philippines.

I sat and listened to the passion and vision of Rev. David Yuccaddi and, once again, a longing welled up within me to someday be a part of what God was doing in the Philippines. But it would be more than two years before this would become a reality.

In the early part of 1996, I began to seriously seek the Lord about this matter of missions. I had no idea how any of this could happen. I had no connections. Dr. Avery was now serving as President of God’s Bible School, I did not know the current mission’s director,

nor had I expressed to anyone other than Becky and some family members my desire to go to the Philippines. One afternoon during a time of prayer and fasting, I laid it all out before the Lord and let it go. Once again, I surrendered my life, my family, and our plans to the Lord. And I reminded him that I wouldn’t open any doors on my own, but that he would have to do it!

The very next morning my phone rang. I picked it up and Rev. Gary Brugger introduced himself as the Director of Bible





Methodist Missions. I listened silently as he went on to tell of how in the place of prayer the day before, He had been asking God to send a missionary family to the Philippines and that our name had come to mind. While I remained outwardly composed and calm—I even told him that I would pray about it and get back with him—on the inside I was jumping up and down. I knew this was my answer. Only God could have done this!

The Bible says, “Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths.” (Proverbs 3:5-6) I knew without a doubt that God was directing our path! This was the beginning of our journey into missions.

YOU SPENT 13 YEARS AS FIELD DIRECTOR IN THE PHILIPPINES. WHAT ARE SOME HIGHLIGHTS?

I would say that the camaraderie of working with our national pastors and “pastora’s” was most life-changing. Witnessing their simplicity of faith, perseverance in ministry, joy in suffering, faithfulness in the execution of their calling, and the power of the gospel at work through their preaching and praying was so formative in our lives. Becky and I learned so much just doing life

and ministry with them.

We were privileged to come alongside and nurture the visions that God was placing in the hearts of our pastors. We helped the national church organize and indigenize for greater growth, and as the work grew, we helped them with countless projects, including the building of dozens of new chapels and other strategic projects.

Being able to equip pastors and young people through the ministry of our Bible

college and our Shepherds Seminars, a program that provided further training for pastors who hadn’t had the opportunity to do formal theological training, brought us so much joy. Seeing many of those pastors finally ordained was wonderful. Then, to realize the desire God planted in my heart as a young college student—the



desire to partner with Rev. David Yucaddi and to support his vision of church planting and pastoral training among the tribes—has been a highlight of my life.

There are many things I could say here. We were personally and profoundly enriched by the lives and examples of our co-workers—David and Christina Black, and missionaries from other groups and traditions as well.

God opened the door for me to obtain a master's degree through the Wesleyan Graduate School for Asia and we also grew our family during our years in the Philippines. We added Jesse, Carolyn, and Samantha. Raising our children in a cross-cultural setting was a blessing. We traveled the country extensively and gave our kids experiences that they wouldn't have known otherwise.

FOR THE PAST TWELVE YEARS, YOU HAVE SERVED AS DIRECTOR FOR BIBLE METHODIST MISSIONS. HOW DID LIFE AS A MISSIONARY PREPARE YOU FOR THE WORK THAT YOU HAVE BEEN DOING, AND WHAT HAS BEEN THE MOST REWARDING ASPECTS OF THIS ROLE?

I know that the whole missionary experience prepared me in so many unique ways. It gave me understanding of the specific challenges that missionaries and national workers face

and a greater awareness of their needs. My greatest fulfillment while serving in this role was rooted in helping to shape and promote the visions God had placed in their hearts for their specific context.

I have been privileged to visit our fields numerous times over the past 12 years, and it has been amazing to witness first-hand the ways that God is growing and blessing our works through the lives of our faithful missionaries, pastors, and national leaders—even amid many setbacks and discouragements. It has been the joy of a lifetime.

Working with our Bible Methodist missionaries has been a privilege. Becky and I have been inspired and challenged by their lives and testimonies. They are our greatest resource.





continues today. I assisted Rev. David Yuccaddi with the establishment of our Banaue training center where he has trained up dozens of men and women who have never had the privilege of attending Bible school. We built and established a training center in the province of Isabela that is still being used today for pastor's training.

Nothing has been closer to my heart in recent years than the establishment of Ezra Biblical Seminary in Mexico where our missionaries are training

WHAT DOES YOUR FUTURE MINISTRY LOOK LIKE?

One of the things that has always been close to my heart is the necessity of training leaders. This passion has been woven into the fabric of all my work beginning

during my earliest days as a young missionary.

We established systematic training programs in the Philippines for under-trained pastors that

dozens of young people.

In 2012 while teaching church leaders in Mozambique, my heart was deeply impacted by the need to train underserved pastors and leaders and to equip national trainers around the world. Each day, I sat under a tree with local



pastors and studied with them until the sun disappeared. They were so eager to learn.

On the final morning, I sat sipping coffee on the front porch of the small missionary guest house and reading the gospel of John. I was overwhelmed by my inability to equip these rising leaders and to provide them adequate resources to continue their training. I had nothing to leave with them other than my own notes, and as I thought about this the Lord began to speak to my heart about serving His underserved body, not just there, but around the world. That morning, the seed that would become Shepherds Global Classroom was planted in my heart. Since that day, God has brought a skilled, godly

team to surround and develop this vision, and that dream of “Christ-centered. Training. Everywhere” is coming to pass.

Bible Methodist Missions will always be the founding partner of this ministry. Thank you!

With your blessing and financial support, SGC was launched. God has blessed and we are now working in 28 languages and 30 countries around the world. This is where Becky and I will be serving in a full-time capacity.

DO YOU HAVE ANY FINAL THOUGHTS?

Becky and I are profoundly grateful for the privilege of serving with Bible Methodist Missions.

Thank you to all our Bible Methodist family for the love and support you’ve shown to us for the past 26 years. Your encouragement and unceasing prayers have lifted us up during difficult days. We are humbled by your care for our family for so many years. We love each of you.

We are excited for the future and for the privilege of continuing to partner with Bible Methodist Missions through the ministry of Shepherds Global Classroom. ■

HEARTLAND YOUTH CAMP [8-12]


